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Father Ray Burkle ... The Love of Jesus Fools the Devil

We have already entered into the season of Lent, a time for us to realize that we are all sinners. Yes, that means me, and yes, that means you. During the season of Lent, our Scripture readings remind us over and over again of our Baptismal promises and penance. Our promises of Baptism are to love the Lord our God with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Our penance should, in some way shape or form, make us better Christians.

The things we do during Lent should change us in some way so that we try to keep doing it after Lent. I remember as a child we would give up television during lent, but because Sunday is a day of rest, we'd watch t.v. throughout the afternoon and evening to get our fill. This is not the spirit or purpose of Lent. A good example of something to do might be to visit people in nursing homes and then, after lent, continue to do so. This also fulfills our Baptismal promise of conversion, continually trying to turn our hearts away from selfishness and towards our God and others.

This year Ash Wednesday started on February 14, which in the past the church celebrated St. Valentine's Day. Although the church no longer celebrates St. Valentines, many people still do. It is very fitting that this year Ash Wednesday falls on this day because lent (and all times) should remind us of the great love that God has for us, a love so strong that he sent His only Son to be our Savior, and Jesus showed us His love by accepting His cross and carrying it with dignity. As I was taught as a child, Jesus loves us so much that he stretched out his hands on the cross saying "this much."

Our love for our God should encourage us to pick up our cross, and to also carry it with dignity. We also are called to share our love, to admit our need for God's love and mercy, to admit our need to change some of our ways to be in line with God's ways. Even though Lent ends before we celebrate the Lord's last supper and His death on Good Friday, we also celebrate with great joy the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday. This year, Easter Sunday falls on April 1. That is right, April Fools Day. God has the last laugh, not the devil. Satan thought that he had won when Jesus was crucified, but God always has the last word, and that word is that death is not the end, but rather the end of the beginning. In death we will also rise with Christ through the glory of the resurrection.

This year from Ash Wednesday through Easter we celebrate that "The love God has for us fools the Devil." We, the believers, are the winners.

Visitation school enrollment in the fall of 1986 was 115 students. Computers were introduced to Visitation. Chimney and church repairs were done. In October 1986, the Christian Mothers sponsored the first quilt show with 180 quilts displayed. The Quilt Club Visitation ladies was organized in February 1987 and sponsored four quilt shows (the last one in 1996). Visitation opened its Day Care the fall of 1987. It was a non-profit self-supporting program open to all children regardless of race, creed, or color. Parish Council approved parish participation in the Archdiocesan RENEW program. Sister Lena Rubly, pastoral assistant, arrived in December. There were 269 box holders. In January1987 Father Thomas Carpender left Sacred Heart, Meyer, and a temporary pastor was assigned. Beginning July 12, Father Manternach was assigned to serve as pastor of Sacred Heart, Meyer, and St. Mel's McIntire.

On July 5, 1988, Rev. Bertin Roll, National Executive Director of the Archconfraternity of Christian Mothers celebrated Mass in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the organization in our parish. Christian mothers are still actively involved in parish functions.

On November 18, 1990, our parish bade farewell to Father Carl Manternach who had been our pastor for ten years. Rev. Paul Otting arrived the same day. He kept a busy schedule with three parishes: Visitation, Sacred Heart Meyer, and St. Ansgar. Renew ended seasons IV and V with a large group of 130 people. They sponsored a "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner" meal in December and March. The hostess of the potluck meal did not know who the guests would be until they arrived.

With only thirty families, St. Mel's, McIntire, closed its doors on July 9, 1991. It was known as an oratory parish church until it was sold later in the year. St. Ansgar with 96 families had Father Joseph Heineman as pastor. At the time, the Archdiocese had 222 active priests. That compared with 309 priests ten years earlier. Sister Lena Rubly resigned. Julie Brumm (Allyn) was hired as Director of Education. In 1991, tuition was established in grade school. School subsidy was \$146,682 paid by Visitation. \$4,624 was paid by Sacred Heart, Meyer. In the same year the Endowment Committee was organized for school funding goals by contacting alumni and others. Sister Lenore Ostdiek was recognized for her many improvements in Visitation School and received an excellent report from the Iowa Department of Education in September 1990. One hundred eleven students started the 1991-1992 school year. The convent roof was shingled.

In 1993, Robert Pitzen resigned as Director of the Cemetery Association. He was replaced by John Faas and Glen Mayer. At the time cemetery plots cost \$150 each. The Northwest Town Circle published a parish cookbook covering the years 1883-1993. Jane and Patty Merten, Faith Formation high school students, traveled to Denver, CO, to participate in the World Youth Pilgrimage with Pope John Paul II. The decision was made to use Today's Missal for liturgy starting the first Sunday in Advent. Sister Lenore was "shared time administrator" of Visitation and Sacred Heart School, Osage.

In 1994, St. Joseph Society, which had been chartered in 1893, ended 101 years of existence. Catholic Aid Society from Minnesota chartered a new council at Visitation on July 22, 1994, its first council in Iowa. There were 50 members who were active for several years. The Christian Mothers enrolled 17 ladies with a solemn reception in November 1995. There were eleven baptisms and fifteen eighth grade graduations that year.

Rev. Paul Otting left July 9, 1996. Rev. Joseph Schneider arrived the same day. Parish Council members as of June 5 were Chairman, Gervin Halbach; Vice Chairman and Finance, Dan Wageman; Secretary, Janet Mayer; Spiritual Growth and Liturgy, Mike Mullenbach; Social Concerns, Karmen Hemann; Parish Life, Therese Halbach.





Totus Tuus – "Totally Yours" "One week summer catechetical program"





Totus Tuus – "Totally Yours" - is a week-long parish catechetical summer program, led by Seminarians and college students, dedicated to sharing the Gospel and promoting the Catholic Faith to children and youth, (first grade - 12th grade) through evangelization, catechesis, Christian Witness and Eucharistic worship.

St. Isidore Faith Formation Programs (Sacred Heart and Visitation) have registered for the Totus Tuus summer program. We have requested the week of June 10-15, 2018. We are currently waiting for confirmation for this week.

This flyer contains an overview of the program, the curriculum and the general schedules.

Please consider registering your children/youth to attend Totus Tuus. It's **not Vacation Bible School**, **it's even more!** If children are in a sports program part of the day, they are welcome to attend when they can.

The following are some comments from other Parishes who have sponsored the program. "Awesome". By the second day the children are asking if they can come again next year. The children were excited about going every day. One child asked his mother if he could go to Totus Tuus rather than Park and Rec.

Totus Tuus - "Totally Yours" – Program Overview Totus Tuus is a summer program dedicated to sharing the Gospel and promoting the Catholic faith to children and youth through evangelization, catechesis, Christian witness, and Eucharistic worship. This week-long parish summer catechetical program assists parents and parishes in the evangelizing and catechizing of their children by supplementing the work they are already doing. The methodology, structure, and content of Totus Tuus is concerned not only with teaching the Faith, but also igniting the hearts of the team members and the young people they encounter. The result has been the formation of young adults who continue to dedicate themselves to the Church's mission of evangelization.

The mission of Totus Tuus is to provide children and teens of the Archdiocese of Dubuque with a meaningful experience of the Catholic faith that fosters solid catechesis, sacramental engagement, and authentic faith-filled role models.

The Motivation of Totus Tuus, a Latin phrase meaning "Totally Yours," was the motto of Saint John Paul II. Taken from St. Louis de Montfort's <u>True Devotion to Mary</u>, it signifies our desire to give ourselves entirely to Jesus Christ through Mary.

The Method of Totus Tuus calls upon seminarians from the Archdiocese of Dubuque and college students from across the United States to carry this mission to every young person they encounter in the parish program. Our missionaries are grouped into teams of four, generally consisting of two men and two women, and are invited to a different parish every week. These teams of missionaries conduct a week-long "parish mission," teaching and inspiring the parish's first through twelfth grade children and teens.

The Totus Tuus Curriculum: The Sacred Scriptures and the Catechism of the Catholic Church provide the foundation of the catechetical instruction of the Totus Tuus summer catechetical program.

Consequently, Totus Tuus has divided the four pillars of the Catechism into a six-year teaching cycle: Year One: The Mystery of Salvation; Year Two: The Apostles' Creed; Year Three: The Sacraments; Year Four: The Commandments; Year Five: The Virtues; Year Six: Prayer and the Our Father.

To complement this six-year cycle, Totus Tuus follows a four-year cycle dedicated to the mysteries of the Rosary: The Joyful Mysteries. The Luminous Mysteries. The Sorrowful Mysteries. The Glorious Mysteries.

The 2018 curriculum will focus on The Apostle's Creed and the Luminous Mysteries.

Why is stretching important?

May the Pietra Fitness rose window always remind us that God made each of us, body and soul, to be a temple for His glory – a beautiful cathedral dedicated to Him alone.


