Lent & Easter

This year, lent starts on March 6. There will be an 8:30am Mass at Sacred Heart and a 6:30pm Mass at Visitation. There will be various services held in the nursing homes, and Sacred Heart Faith Formation will have a service with distribution of ashes at 6:15pm.

Lent is a time of personal reflection on how you are doing in your faith journey with God, others and yourself. I recently heard someone mention the old phrase, "When all else fails, read the instruction manual." The Bible is the instruction manual that God has given us to help us in all moments of life. I encourage you to take time this Lent to pick one book from the New Testament, and read and reflect a little each day on what God is telling us.

During Lent, I will be offering Anointing of the Sick during Masses on March 30 and 31. I'll also be offering it at the care centers while there for Mass. Please see the enclosed Lenten Calendar for locations and days.

Stations of the Cross will be offered before the 8:30am Masses on Wednesdays and Fridays at Visitation, and Friday evenings at 5:00pm at Sacred Heart.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, which this year we will also be starting a Cluster Mission. This year we have Steve Angrisano as our speaker on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday evenings at 7:00 pm at Sacred Heart.

Holy Thursday, Mass of our Lord's Supper is April 18 at 7:00pm at Sacred Heart. Good Friday, Passion of our Lord is at 3:00pm at Sacred Heart. The Easter Vigil will be Saturday, April 20, at Visitation beginning at 8:30pm.

Easter Sunday, April 21, we will have the regular Sunday Mass schedule celebrating the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior.

Notices of time and place are in the bulletin. In the past, there were a few men who attended and we would like to extend a special invitation to you men to give the group a try. We promise to make it more male friendly.

The February meeting had a St. Valentine's Day theme. Sister Millie opened our day with a prayer of Love. We made prayer/rosary boxes to remind us to show our Love for others through prayer. We chose valentines to take to nursing home residents who will be our prayer partners during Lent. A review of Matthew Kelly's book "The Greatest Lie..." reminded us to create "Holy Moments" on our quest for holiness. We ended our afternoon with a tour of our New Church and of course, food (Valentine Treats)! Oh, I can't forget the dancing! Just a little Hokey, Pokey and the Chicken Dance!?

Notice Ladies and MEN: :) The March meeting will be at Limestone Brewers. We hope to learn a little about the craft beer brewing process and maybe taste a bit!

On several occasions I have enjoyed attending soup and bowl fundraisers. Making a bowl on pottery wheel here, glazing a bowl there is a way for many hands to contribute in a small way to gain the big results of build-ing community, raising money for a good cause and gaining a pottery bowl to boot! After my pottery studio opened, the idea of someday doing a soup and bowl fundraiser kept popping up.

When the Sacred Heart Church Building Project began it seemed like the perfect opportunity. There was one big hurdle, however. If I try to do anything fast it promptly falls to pieces. I knew how to make bowls on the pottery wheel and how to teach others, but also knew my slow pace would never produce bowls fast enough to have a large quantity in a short amount of time. Enter Dan Uker. After sharing the fundraising idea with Annette, she mentioned it to Dan. In February 2017, he started learning how to "throw" a bowl on the pottery wheel. After a year of dedicating two afternoons a week to throwing, trimming and glazing, approximately 200 bowls took residence on Kelly's ping-pong table. Other church members and friends glazed an additional 100 pre-made bowls. Our goal was to have them ready by January of 2018 for a soup luncheon but we all know how construction goes! Halleluiah! The time has arrived for the opening of the new church. Kelly is anxious to go back to playing ping-pong with his grandchildren. The bowls must go!

An example follows:

DO NOT BE AFRAID submitted by Carol Sisterman

Over 300 times in the Scriptures we hear the words, "Do not be afraid." I believe God protects me, because He has ridden with me during several scary occasions in my life:

*As a small child, I rode into town with Dad. The steering rod disconnected. The truck rolled into the ditch, not the ravine.

*Nearly 20, I fell asleep at the wheel when returning from canceling classes at the University. Awakened by the sound of a horn from an approaching semi, I pulled to the side of the road and slept until a concerned driver stopped his car to investigate the reason for my stop.

*In my early 30s, I struggled to stay awake as I drove home after a charismatic prayer meeting. It was about 10 pm, dark outside, and the drive home was 30 miles. Suddenly, the car hit gravel on the side of the road. I woke up sufficiently to drive the last five miles to slumber at home.

*As I accessed the freeway, another driver and I glanced at one another eyeball-to-eyeball. He veered sharply to the left away from my vehicle and then to the right to avoid an overpass. We collided and both vehicles stopped. Mom (nearly 90) and I (in my 60s) were safe as were the passengers and the driver in the other car.

*In my 70s, on my way to a wedding, I was confused by the directions and ended up getting a citation when another car collided into my vehicle as I tried to make a U-turn.

Notice that a fatality did not occur in any of these incidents. God shielded me and others. Why do we fear?

People of all ages have memories of God's workings in their lives. Sharing stories of God's presence in our lives is a powerful witness tool. We want to hear your story.

Nurturing Family Faith at Home by John Roberto

"We know how important parents and the whole family are in forming the faith of young people. The United States Catholic Conference of Bishops states that the family is "our first community and the most basic way in which the Lord gathers us, forms us, and acts in the world" (Follow the Way of Love). We know that the primary way by which Catholic identity becomes rooted in children's lives is the day-to-day religious practices of the family and the ways parents model their faith and share it in conversation, collaboration, and exposure to outside religious opportunities. (see, A Report on American Catholic Religious Parenting, page 7).

Parents are simply the most significant influence on religious and spiritual outcomes of young people. (Follow the Way of Love.)

The family is the community where Christian faith practices are nurtured and developed. We have discovered through research that certain faith practices make a significant difference in nurturing the faith of children and adolescents at home. Among the most important practices are:

1. Reading the Bible as a family and encouraging young people to read the Bible regularly.

- 2. Praving together as a family and encouraging young people to pray personally.
- 3. Serving people in need as a family and supporting service activities by young people.
- 4. Eating together as a family.
- 5. Having family conversations.
- 6. Talking about faith, religious issues, and questions and doubts.
- 7. Ritualizing important moments and milestone experiences.
- 8. Celebrating holidays and Church-year seasons at home.
- 9. Providing moral instruction.

10. Being involved in a faith community and participating regularly in Sunday worship as a family."

Totus Tuus – "Totally Yours" - is a week-long parish catechetical summer program, led by Seminarians and college students, dedicated to sharing the Gospel and promoting the Catholic Faith to children and youth, (first grade - 12th grade) through evangelization, catechesis, Christian Witness and Eucharistic worship.

St. Isidore Faith Formation Programs (Sacred Heart and Visitation) will offer Totus Tuus summer program the week of June 9-14, 2019 @ Sacred Heart Faith Formation Center.

This flyer contains an overview of the program, the curriculum and the general schedules.

Please consider registering your children/youth to attend Totus Tuus. It's **not Vacation Bible School**, **it's even more!** If children are in a sports program part of the day, they are welcome to attend when they can.

The following are some comments from other Parishes who have sponsored the program. "Awesome". By the second day the children are asking if they can come again next year. The children were excited about going every day. One child asked his mother if he could go to Totus Tuus rather than Park and Rec. Last year a number of the St. Isidore children asked if we could have Totus Tuus again next year.

Totus Tuus - "Totally Yours" – Program Overview Totus Tuus is a summer program dedicated to sharing the Gospel and promoting the Catholic faith to children and youth through evangelization, catechesis, Christian witness, and Eucharistic worship. This week-long parish summer catechetical program assists parents and parishes in the evangelizing and catechizing of their children by supplementing the work they are already doing. The methodology, structure, and content of Totus Tuus is concerned not only with teaching the Faith, but also igniting the hearts of the team members and the young people they encounter. The result has been the formation of young adults who continue to dedicate themselves to the Church's mission of evangelization.

The mission of Totus Tuus is to provide children and teens of the Archdiocese of Dubuque with a meaningful experience of the Catholic faith that fosters solid catechesis, sacramental engagement, and authentic faith-filled role models.

The Motivation of Totus Tuus, a Latin phrase meaning "Totally Yours," was the motto of Saint John Paul II. Taken from St. Louis de Montfort's <u>True Devotion to Mary</u>, it signifies our desire to give ourselves entirely to Jesus Christ through Mary.

The Method of Totus Tuus calls upon seminarians from the Archdiocese of Dubuque and college students from across the United States to carry this mission to every young person they encounter in the parish program. Our missionaries are grouped into teams of four, generally consisting of two men and two women, and are invited to a different parish every week. These teams of missionaries conduct a week-long "parish mission," teaching and inspiring the parish's first through twelfth grade children and teens.

The Totus Tuus Curriculum: The Sacred Scriptures and the Catechism of the Catholic Church provide the foundation of the catechetical instruction of the Totus Tuus summer catechetical program.

Consequently, Totus Tuus has divided the four pillars of the Catechism into a six-year teaching cycle: Year One: The Mystery of Salvation; Year Two: The Apostles' Creed; Year Three: The Sacraments; Year Four: The Commandments; Year Five: The Virtues; Year Six: Prayer and the Our Father.

To complement this six-year cycle, Totus Tuus follows a four-year cycle dedicated to the mysteries of the Rosary: The Joyful Mysteries. The Luminous Mysteries. The Sorrowful Mysteries. The Glorious Mysteries.

The 2019 curriculum will focus on The Sacraments and the Sorrowful Mysteries.

A Catholic's Guide To Understanding and Embracing God's Word

For five weeks a group of about 15 people have been meeting Thursday evenings for 1¹/₂ hours to read and discuss this book, "The Bible Blueprint". We begin with a prayer asking our Lord to "Guide this group as we study the framework of the bible to better understand Sacred Scripture and how to live it in our daily life".

The author has an interesting way of comparing the Bible to an architect's blueprint. The blueprint is the architect's plan for building a new creation much like God has a blueprint or plan for our salvation, the Bible. This paperback book makes learning about the Bible fun, using humor throughout. I liked this joke. "A cate-chist asked his class to draw pictures of their favorite Bible stories. He was puzzled by Sandy's picture, which showed four people on an airplane, so he asked her which story it was meant to represent. "The flight to Egypt," said Sandy. "I see... and that must be Mary, Joseph and Baby Jesus," the catechist said. "But who's the fourth person?" "Oh, that's Pontius," replied Sandy, "the Pilot."

Seriously, this little book is packed with facts and advice to help one understand the make-up of the bible and tips to help us better understand what we are reading.

Here are some of the Chapter titles: Overcoming Bibliaphobia (fear of the bible) - Preparing to Enter God's Library - The Bible Floor Plan - Recognizing Symbolic Language in the Bible and Do the Math – Numbers in the Bible.

This Book Study has been a great learning experience. We discovered that many of us have had very little in the way of education or experience with how the bible is put together or how to read or pray the Bible. Some of us didn't have bibles in our homes when we were growing up or if we did they were on a shelf or table, but not used. Catholic Radio - RPR 970 AM - and There's an APP for That...by Janice Schonrock

One day while trying to find a radio station as I traveled to Mason City, I came across a Catholic radio station. The station is fairly new and is called RPR (Real Presence Radio). You will find it at 970 AM on your radio dial. RPR Network was started in 2004 in Grand Forks, North Dakota and now is covered by sister stations all over N. Dakota, S. Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Wyoming. In April 2018, a station was started in Austin/Rochester, MN. I discovered it last summer and have been listening almost every day. I have a small old battery operated radio that tunes in to it just fine. You can also easily find it on your car radio.

It is "talk" radio and you will hear programming from EWTN radio and Live Shows produced by RPR. Some of the shows are "Call In" shows where you can actually phone the station and have your questions or comments answered on the show as it's aired. On some shows you can contact them on facebook while they are on air, too. I tried this! It Works! These shows are hosted by priests, theologians, psychologists and very knowledgeable people. Have you ever had questions about life or your faith? If so, here is a place you can go for answers and advice. And, it is anonymous and free! Most of all it is News, Answers, and Advice from a Catholic prospective.

Or, if you would rather listen online, There is an App! There are Free Apps for several Catholic radio stations. Just go to your App Store and type in free apps.... Catholic radio. I have downloaded "RPR Network" - "Iowa Catholic Radio" - "iCatholic Radio" - "Ave Maria Catholic Ra-

I haven't been able to get it on the radio here, but if you are in the Des Moines area, search for it at 1150 AM. One of my daughters listens to it down there. (Jon Leonetti, our Mission presenter from last year, is on this station.)

So, do yourself a favor. The next time you are in your car, maybe traveling to Mason City, tune in to 970 AM (try your house radios, too) and listen to REAL PRESENCE RADIO! Or, pick up your phone right now and download a Catholic radio app. Give it a try! I think you will find it interesting and "Just Maybe" you'll learn more about our Catholic Faith. I know I have!
