Sister Millie Leuenberger, OSF, this summer will celebrate 60 years as a Sister of St. Francis of Dubuque, Iowa.

Congratulations, Sister Millie!

We are blessed to have you live among us.

I was born the youngest of four children to William and Clara Loesch Leuenberger in our family home in Ossian, Iowa. There I lived until I entered the convent of Mount St. Francis in Dubuque on September 3, 1957. My education in grades 1-12 was at St. Francis DeSales Catholic School in Ossian. The Franciscans from Dubuque were my teachers.

My father was a shoe repair man. The Sisters would bring their shoes down to be fixed. When the job was done, I put on my roller skates and headed to the

convent with the shoes. The Sisters were happy to see me and often gave me a cookie or medal as a thank you for returning their shoes.

It was in seventh grade that I made the decision to become a Sister. I perceived the Sisters to be happy people and I wanted to be happy. Reception Day into the community was August 12, 1958. Going to Mass that day, presided by the Archbishop, we were dressed as brides. It was at Mass that we received our brown habits and veils. Quickly exiting to another room, we donned the habits and veils (with help from two Sisters) and returned to the chapel. Then those present heard what our names would be as Sisters. I became Sister Mary Willamene, OSF. Willamene is a form of William. I was named after my father who died after my sophomore year in high school. In the late 1960s, I returned to my baptismal name of Mildred. After three years of formation, I took my first vows of poverty, chastity and obedience on August 12, 1960. Final (perpetual) profession was on August 12, 1963. At that time I received my Franciscan ring.

I graduated from Briar Cliff in Sioux City with a degree in elementary education. Except for Sauk Rapids, Minnesota, all the schools I taught in were in Iowa: Garnavillo, Monticello, Holy Trinity Dubuque, St. Mary's Waterloo, Templeton, Halbur, and Pocahontas. In 1983, I left elementary school teaching and took up ministry as pastoral associate in various locations: Maquoketa; Elma with Msgr. John W. Hemann; Lourdes, Alta Vista, North Washington, Ionia, and Nashua. I began my ministry in St. Isidore Cluster in March 2007.

January 3, 1995, I became the Pastoral Administrator of the churches in Balltown and Sherrill. This was a canonical appointment by Archbishop Daniel Kucera, OSB. I was responsible for the life of the parishes, except for Mass and the sacraments. Rev. Mel Hemann was my sacramental priest until he retired. Rev. Tom Zinkula, now bishop in Davenport, succeeded him.

I retired on January 31, 2012. Living in your midst, I continue to minister in prayer and presence. A Jubilee celebration with my Sister Community will be on June 24, 2018, at Mount St. Francis in Dubuque. An Open House in Sr. Millie's honor will be Sunday August 12, 2018, at Visitation from 2:00-4:00 p.m.



Full of Fair Hope......Red Lake Mission "On the second Sunday of Advent, December 10, 2017,

Sisters Philip Zimmer, Ruth Ann Schneider, and Owen Lindblad drove to Red Lake. Sister Mary Lou Carlson of Red Lake had gone on ahead. It was not an ordinary trip for us.

As we made the last turn past the familiar grove of pines and into sight of St. Mary's Mission, sorrow filled our hearts. For there, where the little white mission church, St. Mary's, always stood, faint wisps of smoke lingered over ruins that bore witness to a devastating fire that had crept in unseen during the night of December 2. Nothing survived but the large bell now hidden in the pit under a smoldering debris of beloved treasures, not least of which was the Blessed Sacrament, artwork, and vestments that can never be replaced.



One hundred sixty years before, this parish, termed "full of fair hope" by missioner Father Francis Xavier Pierz, welcomed, but quickly lost, its first resident pastor young, zealous Father Lawrence Lautischar. In his enthusiasm to serve the Ojibwe people, he set out on his return trip from Ponemah where he had ministered to the sick back to Red Lake over the frozen lake in a blinding snowstorm. He froze to death just a few miles from the mission house where a large bonfire had been set to guide his way home. It was the first Sunday of Advent.

However, the new mission was meant to grow. With the hopes of the people and with building material purchased by (Saint) Katharine Drexel, who had visited this place "full of fair hope," and with pleas from the elders for religious services from the Benedictine priests and sisters of Saint John's and Saint Benedict's, a parish was formed. For over 120 years, the lives of these Benedictines have been woven with those of the Ojibwe people of St. Mary's.

So, it was right that we would be there now for the people grieving in their sad hour. All gathered in the school gym for the celebration of the Eucharist: priests, sisters, elders, families with children. During a simple lunch served afterwards, we visited with our old friends. We were inspired by the hope and courage that was expressed among them."

St. Isidore Cluster has taken up 2<sup>nd</sup> collections for Red Lake Indian Reservation several times. Our next collection for them is in July. Marvin and Marilyn Reis take supplies to them once per year. Marilyn said it was a cute little church. The Reis' are trying to contact them to see if there are any other needs that we can provide.

Mary, Queen of May— The annual May Crowning rite was celebrated on May 6th, prior to the Sunday morning Mass as the First Communicants and Kelly Brumm honored Mary with a crown of flowers and bouquets while the congregation sang the hymn, "On this day O Beautiful Mother, On this day we give these our love...." May crownings take place in many Roman Catholic parishes and homes. Characteristic of May devotions is the May Altar, whether in a church or as a "house altar" in the home. Marian devotions such as the rosary may take place within the family around a home altar consisting of a table with a Marian picture, candles, and decorated with many May flowers.

The rite for these crownings is flexible and can be adapted to different circumstances. Often it consists of prayers such as the Hail Holy Queen, Hail Marys or the Rosary along with hymns such as "Queen of the May" or "Hail Holy Queen Enthroned Above". This is concluded with placing the crown of flowers on Mary's head.




# 2019 St. Isidore Parish Mission
